They will gain an overview of security risks such as terrorism, climate change, mass migration and transnational non-state armed groups as well as interstate war, nuclear proliferation and political violence. They will also gain an overview and understanding of economic, political and military means (including sanctions, trade flows, propaganda, militaries, media, access to resources etc.) and the different strategies of how various actors apply these means to achieve certain outcomes in world affairs. This includes learning about (grand) strategies in geopolitics, geoeconomics, warfare and global governance.

1. Content and intended learning outcomes								
Content	Geoeconomic rivalry, especially between the United States and China, has a massive impact on Germany and Europe. It will also significantly impact Franco-German relations, an aspect which will require further study. New global market-power conditions require geo-economic rethinking, a broader concept of security that combines economic, military, and security-related dimensions. The concept of geo-economics is used to put non-military instruments of statecraft in the analytical focus. In this utilitarian understanding, economics, in particular trade, investment, technology or fiscal policy, is understood as a means for achieving (geo)strategic objectives. In concrete terms, it is a question of managing or manipulating energy, industrial, data and financial flows politically with regulations, (secondary) sanctions, or controlling investment in strategic sectors.							
Learning outcomes	Students will learn to understand geo-economic logic and acquire the skills to elaborate sound practice-oriented policy advice, which is not an academic glass bead game, but provides forward-looking and thus timely help to solve problems. Students will gain a more practice-oriented thinking beyond the classical economics training and an expanded geo-economic rethinking of international relations. The aim of this module is to develop concrete ideas for problem-oriented foreign policy advice in order to improve German and European decision-making in the face of new market power conditions.

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Module Title: European Regulation of Network Industries, Basic Public Services and Security of Supply (Elective)

Module ID/Code:

### 1. Content and intended learning outcomes

#### Content

The Module "European Regulation of Network Industries, Basic Public Services and Security of Supply" offers the participants in the Master program an opportunity to familiarize themselves with competition law and the law of sector-specific regulation as crucial parts of the single market of the European Union. The course will introduce the general policies and principles of EU competition law as well as intersections and differences between competition law and sectoral regulations. This includes theoretical and practical approaches. In the course of the lecture, each area of competition law will be examined more closely on the basis of secondary legislation, Commission Guidelines as well as significant court cases. In this context, the module specifically deals with offenses and legal consequences of the competition law standards of European primary law (Articles 101, 102 and 107 TFEU) and the relevant exemption regulations. In addition, the module provides an overview of the sector-specific policies and regulations, including their legal basis.

With their cruciality having become apparent in the course of the energy crisis, the Module will focus on basic public services (in particular telecommunications and energy) and the regulatory and political means to secure their supply.

#### **Learning outcomes**

Students will be provided an overview of European competition law (antitrust law and state aid control) and will learn the differences and intercorrelations between competition law and sector-specific regulation, especially with regard to basic public services. The main objective is to analyse the Union's relevant TFEU Articles and highlight the underlying rules and principles. In addition, there will be a focus on case law and legislation. While the module intends to be thorough and intense, at the same time it should still prove accessible to students who have not obtained a degree in law, or completed legal courses before.
